





PETER AUBREY

Trained at the Drama Centre and has worked in reps from Perth to Canterbury. His appearances in the theatre include CAUCASIAN CHALK CIRCLE, THE IMPORTANCE OF BEING EARNEST, HOBSON'S CHOICE, MAN AND SUPERMAN, DR FAUSTUS, HENRY V, ANTONY AND CLEOPATRA and HAMLET. His television work includes WITHIN THESE WALLS, GRAHAMS GANG and Jimmy Young's IT FIGURES.

DAVID BALE

David began in the theatre after spending nine years as a Chartered Librarian and his first job after his theatrical training was as the 'Ape' in the touring Sooty Show! He is well-known to Nottingham audiences, and last appeared at the Playhouse in the 1979 Christmas show THE INCREDIBLE ADVENTURES OF PROFESSOR BRANESTAWM, Since then he has worked on the Young Writers Festival and improvised sessions called MAKE A PLAY with the T.I.E. Company, Roundabout. He also spent a year with the Nottingham Music Theatre and Caravansari, where he performed the role of the Narrator in FACADE. His repertory work includes THE THREEPENNY OPERA and THERE GOES THE BRIDE, and last New Year's Eve he read the Ogden Nash poems for the English Sinfonia's CARNIVAL OF THE ANIMALS performance.

EDWARD CLAYTON

Edward started work at the Alexandra Theatre, Birmingham in 1955. He left a year later and worked in many different professions, including printing, engineering, building, etc. After attending drama school, he started with the Royal Shakespare Company in Peter Brook's MARAT/SADE, followed by appearances at the Victoria, Stoke on Trent,, the Royal Court, the Octagon, Bolton and the Everyman in Liverpool. Last summer he made a film SANDRA, written and directed by Tony Garnett and he has made over 800 television appearances.

STEVEN CROSSLEY

Trained at RADA and spent his first year in repertory at the Redgrave Theatre, Farnham and subsequently worked at the Crucible, Sheffield and the Haymarket, Leicester. He then appeared on the London fringe with Shared Experience's critically acclaimed ARABIAN NIGHTS TRILOGY. He then joined the National Theatre Company for a year until 1979. His television work includes a Play of the Week AN ORDERED LIFE, THERESE RAQUIN by Emile Zola and SECRET ARMY for the BBC. Recently Steven completed work on the film THE MINE AND THE MINOTAUR for the Children's Film Foundation and has just come from Birmingham Rep where he played Edgar in KING LEAR.

CHRIS DARWIN

Was born in Liverpool and trained at Webber Douglas. After touring in childrens theatre, Chris joined the Everyman at Liverpool where he played many parts from an eight year old delinquent to an eighty year old geriatric general. He has worked in fringe theatre and toured with the 7:84 Theatre Company in BITTER APPLES and has appeared at Leicester in MOBY DICK, Chris's television work includes A SENSE OF PLACE, a BBC TV North series and Granada's THE CELEBRATION. He has also done several radio plays and most recently played Roger McGough's dog in a play called A DOG CALLED DOG, He last appeared at the Playhouse in HOTEL PARADISO.

NORMAN GREGORY

Was a photographer before becoming an actor. He trained at RADA and since then has appeared at many reps including Leatherhead, Canterbury and Oxford, and took the role of Octavius with the production of JULIUS CAESAR at the Nottingham Playhouse. 




